Education is a strategic focus area for Finland and for the Fulbright Finland Foundation. We are excited to have designed a program specifically for U.S. K-12 education administrators. The intensive 10-day program facilitates the sharing of best practices between U.S. and Finnish education administrators and educators, and supports the dialogue that addresses innovations in school leadership.

The program will begin in the capital city Helsinki with briefings and strategic discussions providing the background and framework of the Finnish education system and school leadership. Finnish education is rooted in the values and culture of our society. The program will shed light onto the cultural and societal elements that contribute to our education system. Finns have a close relationship with nature. "Nature schools," phenomenon-based learning and even school recess bring the natural environment closer to students and highlight the wellbeing that the beautiful natural settings can provide for everyone. We invite you to experience the nature school at the Nuuksio National Park in Espoo, relax in the sauna, even try ice-swimming in the Baltic sea.

Timely themes in education are covered in two Fulbright Finland Foundation seminars. 2019 Fulbright Forum: Education, Innovation, Science and Art explores Biotechnology, Career Pathways from Secondary Education to the Workplace in Finland, Phenomenon-Based



Learning, and many more topics introduced by our current American Fulbright scholars, teachers, and students in Finland. A special Fulbright seminar, *Truth Matters: Strategies for Combating Manipulated Realities*, addresses disinformation, media literacy, and fact-checking, and it takes place at Oodi, the brand new Helsinki Central Library that describes itself as not just a library but as "your interface to everything".

A key strength of the Fulbright Finland Foundation is the strategic engagement of the alumni. 

FULBRIGHT FINLAND FOUNDATION Together Shaping the Future

THE FULBRIGHT FINLAND FOUNDATION is an independent not-for-profit based in Helsinki, Finland. With the purpose of promoting a wider exchange of knowledge and professional talents through educational contacts between Finland and the United States, the Foundation collaborates with a range of government, foundation, university and corporate partners on both sides of the Atlantic to design and manage study and research scholarships, leadership development programs and internationalization services.

IN 2018, the Fulbright Finland Foundation awarded over EUR 1,33 million in grants to 87 Finnish and American researchers, students, and professionals. Additionally, Fulbright Finland responded to over 5,300 client contacts and organized or participated in over 70 training events around Finland.

FULBRIGHT FINLAND SUPPORTS the internationalization of education and research in Finland, and helps U.S. and Finnish institutions create linkages. The Foundation organizes themed study tours for Finnish education experts to the United States and for American education experts to Finland. The Foundation also runs the highly popular Fulbright Speaker Program, the Fulbright Dialogues series, and the Transatlantic Roundtables, as well as organizes several national Fulbright Seminars every year. **THE FOUNDATION IS FUNDED** by the Finnish Ministry of Education and Culture, the U.S. Department of State, the Finland-America Educational Trust Fund, private foundations, Finnish and U.S. higher education institutions, alumni of the Fulbright Finland programs, and private donors. Over 70% of the Foundation's core funding originates from Finland, and advancement, fundraising and sponsored grants are a central part of the operation. A key strength of the Foundation is the consistent strategic engagement of the alumni.

OVER 5,500 FINNS AND AMERICANS have received a grant from the Finnish-American program since its inception in 1949 and the Fulbright Finland Foundation runs an active and rapidly growing alumni network in both countries.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS of the Fulbright Finland Foundation consists of eight members appointed by the Finnish Ministry of Education and the U.S. Embassy in Finland. The U.S. Ambassador to Finland serves as the Honorary Chair of the Board. The Foundation office is located in Helsinki. The Foundation is managed by the CEO together with eight staff members.

THE YEAR 2019 marks the 70th anniversary of the Foundation and the 100th anniversary of the diplomatic relations between Finland and the United States.

HELSINKI

HELSINKI, THE CAPITAL OF FINLAND, is the administrative center of the country and an important hub of business and culture. Called the "Daughter of the Baltic", Helsinki is located in southern Finland on the shore of the Gulf of Finland. The population of Helsinki is about 600 000. In 2018 Helsinki was one of the fastest growing cities in Europe.

Helsinki has several public and private schools, of which 9 are international schools. There are a total of 9 higher education institutions; 4 universities and 5 universities of applied sciences (UAS). These include universities such as the University of Helsinki, Hanken University, Metropolia UAS and Haaga-Helia UAS. Helsinki is also home to one of the largest music academies in Europe, the Sibelius Academy and has one vocational education center where one can study for various professions from car repair to travel services. Some of the most prestigious high schools of Finland are located in Helsinki.

JYVÄSKYLÄ

JYVÄSKYLÄ, LOCATED IN CENTRAL FIN-LAND, is among the fastest growing cities in Finland. Jyväskylä is easily reachable from the capital area by car, bus, train or air. The city's population is roughly 140 000 inhabitants. Two out of seven of the Finnish UNESCO world heritage sites are located in Jyväskylä.

Jyväskylä is famous for its university, which brings a lively campus life to the city. The university was originally the first Finnish-speaking teacher-training school in Finland, founded in 1863. There are four high schools, two vocational schools and one university of applied sciences located in the city. The Jyväskylä-based vocational school Gradia helped open the first Finnish-International high school in the world in Qatar in 2019.



SEMINARIUM

The Seminarium in Jyväskylä is the birthplace of Finnish teacher education and where its father, Uno Cygnaeus, spoke and gave lectures.

The Seminarium was designed by Konstantin Kiseleff and construction finished in 1883. The building was designed to be the headquarters of Jyväskylä's male teacher seminar and it included teaching facilities and a ballroom. The ballroom was the biggest celebration space in Jyväskylä between 1880 and 1900. Christmas parties were held in the ballroom and so the holiday tradition "*kuusijuhla*" spread across Finland with newly graduated teachers. Many of today's most popular Finnish Christmas songs were performed for the first time in the Seminarium.

Starting in late 1940 defense of doctoral dissertations has been organized in the Seminarium and the tradition continues to this day.


ESPOO

ESPOO IS THE SECOND LARGEST CITY IN FINLAND with the population of approximately 280 000 people. Espoo has five city centers, all of which have their own unique characteristics. In Espoo, you can enjoy Finnish nature in Nuuksio national park and visit EMMA museum of modern art. Espoo is home to Aalto University, which is a multidisciplinary community that teaches engineering, art, science and business. In Espoo learning is valued, and there are 170 early childhood education centers, 88 comprehensive schools, 16 art schools and 3 higher education institutes.


VANTAA

VANTAA, THE FOURTH LARGEST CITY IN FINLAND with 223 000 residents, is an international airport city, and a neighbor to Espoo and Helsinki. Vantaa is home to many different cultures and more than 100 different languages. Although Vantaa is an urban airport city, you can still enjoy the beauty of nature in the many parks and forests of Vantaa. In Vantaa there is an international school, where comprehensive studies can be completed in English. Vantaa also organizes comprehensive education for young immigrants. Students who are not native Finnish, Swedish or Sami speakers may also receive language education in their own language. Schools in Vantaa teach approximately 30 different languages.
